
The Jacksons are a normal, suburban family, honest, open and truthful. One evening they are consulted by the Police about having someone in their house for the weekend as a lookout, to watch the street for a possible courier connection to a Russian spy. As the weekend turns into weeks, slowly but steadily they find themselves drawn into the murky world of deceptions and secrets, forcing them to lie to everyone, including their best friends: their neighbours Helen and Peter Kroger; who may or may not be involved...

This is the early 1960s and the world is in the grip of the Cold War, yet while suspicions abound, it's difficult to imagine it happening under our noses in Britain. More shocking then, is that Hugh Whitemore's play is based on a true story... This is a compelling and gripping story about best friends and family forced to keep secrets from each other: a spy story about real people stuck in lies and betrayal.

Bob Jackson

Married to Barbara, father to Julie. Playing age 35+

Bob is a civil servant, always honest and upright. A traditional man, he would be called old fashioned by today's thinking. Has some wonderful emotional moments through "stiff upper lip", with a great story arc. Will be fascinating to play.

Barbara Jackson

Married to Bob, mother to Julie. Best friends with Helen. Playing age 35+

Barbara is a home maker, using the language of the day a housewife, and she would be proud to call herself this. She worries about her daughter, she paints and she bakes. She is able to be vicariously adventurous through her best friend. She is very detailed and nuanced and will be fascinating and rewarding to play. Loads of layered emotions throughout, a great challenge for a character actor.

Julie Jackson

Daughter to Bob and Barbara. Close friendship with Helen, like an aunt. Playing age 17

There is a lovely opportunity here for an actor to play emotional layers with this character, as she is a teen growing up in a traditional family situation, yet there are hints to a boyfriend and life outside. This could be a lovely fun role for someone 16+.

Peter Kroger

Married to Helen. American accent. Playing age 30+

The most contained of them all, especially compared to his wife, and a lovely opportunity to play with the emotional layering of this character. Smaller role, but crucial.

Helen Kroger

Married to Peter. American accent. Playing age 30+

Helen brings light and joy into Barbara's life and is probably aware that she brings Barbara out of her shell. Her outwardness hides hidden layers, and she needs to be played authentically not just larger than life. A great challenge for a character actor.

Stewart

Playing age 30+

He is linked with Scotland Yard, probably MI6, and comes to their house and asks for their help. He doesn't really understand how imposing it is, and how much this affects them all – or maybe he does. A stoic and upright character, but again, with layers.

Thelma

Playing age 22+

Working for Stewart, being a lookout at the Jackson's home. Suitable for a female presenting actor who would like a smaller role. She is respectful yet young and has a life outside of being in the house to watch the street, and she likes the family and doesn't want to be a burden.

Sally

Playing age 22+

Working for Stewart, being a lookout at the Jackson's home. Suitable for a female presenting actor who would like a much smaller role. She only has a couple of scenes and doesn't really care for the family, but believes in her job.
